Every year on August 19th, World Humanitarian Day honors the work of humanitarians who are no longer with us — as well as those who continue to do important humanitarian work. This includes all individuals involved in humanitarian work; volunteers, health workers, aid workers, and others who strive to alleviate human suffering. No matter what disaster, disease, or injustice is impacting a community, there are always people who arestepping up to make a difference.

The United Nations established World Humanitarian Day in 2009 to honor the memory of 22 humanitarian workers who lost their lives in a bombing at the Canal Hotel in Baghdad, Iraq, in 2003. For World Humanitarian Day, "we show the importance, effectiveness and positive impact of humanitarian work."

Global Achievements in Humanitarian Work:

- Education: 896,900 + refugee and host community children in 80 countries supported with connected or home-based learning. (UNHRC Human Rights Council)
- Food Assistance: Nearly 105 million people received direct food aid in the first nine months (January - September) of 2021. (WFP World Food Program)
- Hygiene Items: 26.9 million people reached with critical WASH supplies including hygiene items - and services. (UNICEF International Children's Emergency Fund)
- Livelihoods: 18 million people have received livelihoods assistance: cash, heating, livestock rearing, crop production and fishing. (FAO Food and Agriculture Organization)
- Medical Supplies: 2 million people, including health workers, reached with personal protective equipment supplies in twenty-nine countries. (UNFPA Population Fund)
- Psychosocial Support: 5 million children and caregivers accessed mental health and psychosocial support. (UNICEF International Children's Emergency Fund)
- Refugees: 4.2 million refugees, asylum-seekers and others of concern in 74 countries received essential healthcare services. (UNHRC Human Rights Council)
- Safe Spaces: 12,000 safe spaces for women, adolescent girls and young people were supported in 38 countries. (UNFPA Population Fund)
- Safe Water: 34 million people, some forcibly displaced, accessed safe water for drinking, cooking and personal hygiene. (UNICEF International Children's Emergency Fund)
